### Synthesis

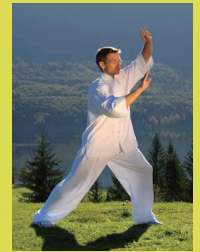
Apply acquired skills to real life business situations; develop personal action plans to sustain learning and ensure application & implementation

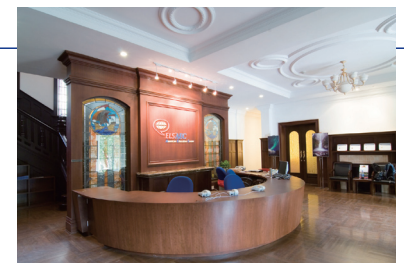
Application Procedure:
